

If you are reading this, it may be because someone you love has died, or you may be considering developing a 'Funeral Plan' or you just need information.

A funeral is used to mark the end of a person's life here on earth. Family and friends come together to express grief, give thanks for the life lived and commend the person into God's keeping. Funerals can be small, quiet ceremonies or large occasions; in every situation we will try to meet your expectations.

As people we live life knowing that one day we will die. As Christians we know also that God loves us deeply. Through the life, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ his son, we are given new life and a promised place with him in paradise. Love never ends. In knowing this there is much comfort and hope. However, at a life's end families and friends feel grief and sometimes deep despair. Most people die after a long fulfilled life; others sadly die prematurely or tragically. Whatever the circumstance we want to assure you of our understanding and care. The family and ministers of St Mary's have long experience in helping and supporting families through bereavement, and also in accompanying people preparing for death.

How do l'arrange a funeral?

If you are the next of kin, it will usually fall to you to arrange the funeral. Usually your chosen Funeral Director will visit and note your preference for either:

- a funeral service in St Mary's Church followed by cremation or burial; or
- a funeral service within the chapel of a crematorium; or more rarely a service in a cemetery chapel before burial.

The Funeral Director, knowing your wishes, will liaise with Fr Barry and agree the place, date and time of the service.

Fr Barry will then contact you, and arrange for either himself or another minister, to come and speak to you about your loved one, the service and your needs.

We always recommend a service in church, as it is a special and holy place at the heart of the community. However, we will always respect your choice and in all situations will provide the very best of care.

Who will take the funeral?

Ordained priests, deacons and licensed readers. A reader is someone specially selected and trained in theology; they are licensed by the Bishop of Durham and work under the supervision of the Rector.

The service can be what you want and need it to be. There are a variety of ways for you, your family and friends to become involved in the planning and leading of the funeral. From selecting music and readings to speaking on behalf of the deceased. Your bereavement minister will give you every help in planning the funeral.



Can you help with the reception?

Yes. We have good facilities in the nearby St Mary's Centre and are able to put you in contact with local caterers. Please speak to Christine Graham, Parish Manager, 0191 488 1553; Christine will discuss costs with you.

Do you offer aftercare?

Yes. We are here to serve people in our

community and will help wherever possible. One of the ways we offer care is through prayer. The name of the deceased is added to our prayer list and is prayed for over a three week period. We also have a 'prayer chain' if greater support is needed; and remember you can always contact Fr Barry. In addition to this:

- after about eight weeks a member of our team of trained 'bereavement listeners' who will ring you, and ask if you need further help;
- there is a special service in November in which we remember all who have died in the year, you and your family will be invited to join us; and
- you can have the name of the deceased entered into our memorial book, free of charge (see page 10).

Can I leave a legacy to St Mary's Church?

Yes. We would encourage all members of the congregation, and others having goodwill for the parish to leave legacies for the church of St Mary's. Legacies should be made in a way which balances the interests and aspirations of donors on the one hand with the ever changing needs of the parish on the other. If you're considering making a bequest please have a word with Fr Barry.

Can you offer any words of comfort?


Below are a small selection of poems and prayers that others have found helpful.

In church, music before and after the service is played by the organist. Specific music can be requested; similarly if you wish, recorded music may be played if you provide the tracks.



Can the collection to be given to a charity?

We recognise the need to care and support families through bereavement. Often requests are received for collections in church to be made to appropriate charities. We are therefore happy to halve the offerings received on our collection plate at a funeral, and send 50% to a nominated charity on behalf of the family, in memory of the deceased. This represents the giving of family, friends and the church.

Ministers, when visiting bereaved family members, will ask them if they intend to nominate a charity. Our policy will be explained and a form left, requesting details of any charity they wish to support. This form must be sent to our Parish Office within 28 days of the date of the funeral. The Parish Office will arrange for the money to be sent on. A letter will be sent to the next of kin confirming the transaction. We will ask the charity concerned to write and thank the family. (*Please note should no request be made within 28 days of the funeral, all donations will remain in the ownership of St Mary's church.*)

What are your Fees?

Please note, other fees may apply depending on the situation. Our fees are generally included in the quotation you receive from the Funeral Director.

What are Churchyard Rules?

Churchyards are different to cemeteries in both ownership and in 'terms of conditions' of use. Many people are not aware of this distinction. We are happy to receive applications for burial/ interments where the applicants agree to abide by the 'churchyard rules' of the Diocese of Durham.

The rules concern the size, shape and type of stone, along with the inscription and lettering to be used. They specifically prohibit the use of kerbs, railings, chippings or chains, pictures, portraits, photographs and bird baths. We believe it is important that you are aware of these conditions from the outset so you are not disappointed later. Ministers of the church will discuss things in more detail during the bereavement visit. Should you require further clarification or Information please ring Fr Barry.

Who owns the grave?

The fee for burial/interment in the churchyard does not constitute the purchasing of land. The land is owned by the Church. Similarly any memorial stone erected by the family remains their property and responsibility.

Can other be buried in an existing grave?

Yes, as long as there is family agreement, sufficient space and it is safe to do so. The same fees will apply.
